**MEDIATION IN RACE AND CULTURAL CONTEXTS (ADR Institute Accredited Advanced Course)**

Dominant, mainstream conflict resolution methods fail to recognize and integrate perspectives of culturally diverse peoples and communities. This training offers a way to address the gap.

Mediation in Race and Cultural Contexts also exposes participants to **the elephants in the room**. It allows participants to broaden perspectives on the sources and escalators of conflict within multicultural/multiethnic contexts and infuses a multiple lens approach salient to particular needs for future practice.

Participants of this course will develop competencies and acquire tools that allow for the provision of balanced services to people from all social and cultural backgrounds while expanding their scope of practice to integrate cultural knowledges and practices.

NOTE CAREFULLY:

1. This course requires assigned readings that constitute one-third of the number of hours necessary for a participant to be deemed to have completed the requirements for certification. In-class sessions are devoted to case studies, case analysis, audio-visual resources, and to subject matter expert presentations.
2. The ADR Institute does not prescribe the order in which courses should be taken by candidates seeking Chartered Mediator (C.Med ) or Qualified Mediator (Q.Med) accreditation.
